This year we have been learning about S.T.E.M (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths). Students have been involved in a range of activities that require them to work as a team to solve a problem. They are developing their creative and critical thinking, problem solving skills and team work skills. The students are enthusiastic during these lessons to see whether their design or technique will work. Recently they were faced with a challenge to create a pyramid out of cups using only some string, rubber band, cotton balls and straws.



The catch was that they were not allowed to touch the cups with their own body. As the challenge went on they were only allowed to use a smaller amount of items although, this didn't stop them. They quickly adapted and came up with a new technique to succeed. Earlier in the year students were faced with an egg drop challenge. Here is what some students thought of the activity.



*The Egg Drop!*

*On Wednesday, my entire class did the egg drop challenge. We did it to see how you can protect the egg. We went under the C.O.L.A. to drop the egg. Miss Bosworth, our teacher, showed us a Power Point about Humpty Dumpty. When she told us the challenge we picked our groups. In my group there was Kara and Shaela. We started drawing our design but we had to change it a lot. We had to change it because we knew it wouldn't work and Miss Bosworth told us the materials we could use. When we picked the right design Miss Bosworth gave us the material. We started sticking everything together. We started struggling a lot. Our design turned out to look like nothing from our plan. We thankfully finished our design. WE went outside to drop the egg and while I was waiting for our turn, the design started breaking so I had to fix it. It was then out turn, we knew it wouldn't work. Miss Bosworth dropped the egg and it cracked. Kara picked the egg up because we didn't want to pick it up after that. Tanisha poured water all over the yolk on the ground. I thought the egg drop was really fun. I can't wait until the next time we do this. I think everyone had a great time. By Sinead C.*

*On Wednesday, the whole class did the egg drop challenge. We had ten straws, 2 tissues and 60cm of tape to stop an egg cracking. Alice and I were in a group. We did this in the classroom and under the C.O.L.A. We did this in a STEM lesson. First we got out our topic books and drew a design. Half of the egg had to be showing, you couldn't tap the egg to anything and you only had 30 minutes. So Alice and I got started. We were half way through making it and then the egg rolled off the table and crack on the chair. We did not have any more eggs to use. Then we went outside and watched the others do their egg drop. They had to drop the egg from 1 metre in height. I washed the eggs in to the drain with some water. We decided that we will make ours at Alice's house and film it. When I got to Alice's place we played outside then had tea. After tea we started and finished the holder for the egg. Krysten filmed ups. Two day later we got the class to watch the video and our egg broke on the first drop. I was really fun bit I think that next time we should take care of the egg more. 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Dear Families,

The term is progressing and students have been engaged in a wide range of learning activities as demonstrated by the middle primary students at their assembly last week. It was fantastic to see families come along to watch their children and it is always a highlight for the school. Congratulations to the students and staff for their achievements this term.

This week we are the host school for the SAPSASA Rugby League Carnival involving 4 schools, 10 teams and 100 students. Many thanks to Dean Carter for his efforts organising the day and liaising with schools in the competition. This is a great opportunity for our students to meet students from different school, develop their skills in competitive sports and to have fun.

This term we have embarked on a whole school Intervention and Enrichment program to support student learning in specific targeted areas of literacy and numeracy to lift achievement in the higher bands. 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
### ATTENDANCE - EVERYDAY COUNTS!!!

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### NATIONAL CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA - STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

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We have commenced the annual nationally consistent collection of data on school students with disability ('the Collection'). This will involve the collection of: the number of students receiving adjustments to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students; the level of adjustment provided to students; and where known, the student's type of disability. Under the Collection model the definition of disability is broad and includes learning difficulties, health and mental health conditions.

If your child is identified for inclusion in the Collection, the required information about your child will be included in this year's data collection.


*What is your favourite maths thing to do?*


